The Cincinnati Fire Museum highlights the significant contributions that Cincinnati has made to the firefighting profession.



THE MUSEUM'S COLLECTION



The Cincinnati Fire Museum's Collection numbers over 700 items plus a sizeable archive of photos, documents, and records. It represents the firefighting history of Cincinnati from the very first volunteer fire company formed in 1808. The fire alarm drum and brass key to the first fire house in 1808, along with parade hats, impressive handpumped engines, and wooden water pipes have been displayed to illustrate the exciting bucket

brigade years of Cincinnati Fire Volunteers.

In 1852, Shawk and Latta of Cincinnati built the nation's first steam fire pumper. This invention paved the way for Cincinnati to establish the first professional fire department in the United States in 1853. The exhibits highlighting this important period feature an impressive horse-drawn steam pumper, ladder wagons, helmets, badges, and many more fascinating items.

In 1917, Cincinnati became one of the nation's first fully-motorized fire companies, and the Ahrens-Fox Company of Cincinnati emerged as a leading builder of fire equipment. Two full-size Ahrens-Fox Engines in all their glory, are featured along with many other items of equipment. The outstanding collection of artifacts and graphics are the nucleus of the Cincinnati Fire Museum, making it a unique and prominent national attraction.

IN 2019 the Fire Museum accepted several important artifacts into our collection. These artifacts include four firemarks with origins from the Greater Cincinnati area and a ceremonial fire-axe originally presented to Vickie Goodson, one of Cincinnati Fire Department's first female firefighters, at her retirement. Additionally, the Museum accepted a donation of thousands of toy trucks, the majority of which are fire department related.

The Cincinnati Fire Museum has something to offer for the whole family. Kids can:


- Visit our Safe House and practice life saving fire safety skills.

FIRE SAFETY EDUCATION

The Cincinnati Fire Museum, in conjunction with the Cincinnati Fire Department, operates a world-class fire safety education program designed to teach participants how to prevent fires within the home and how to protect themselves and escape should a fire occur. The Museum presents a simulated fire event in a mock home environment. Educators lead a tour and discussion through several rooms in a mock home. In each room, various fire

and burn hazards are demonstrated and explanations are offered as to how each can cause a fire and what can be done to prevent it.

1N 2019 our Fire Safety Education Program served 8,057 visitors. In order to ensure schools and families can participate in our program, we keep the group rate at a minimum cost - only \$3 per student. We depend on gifts from donors and foundations to keep this cost affordable to the community. The Cincinnati Fire Museum is currently the only insitution in Cincinnati that saves lives through fire prevention. This is a vital role that the Museum plays and a significant part of our mission. Our program endeavors to make fire prevention everyone's responsibility and to reduce the number of fires and fire related deaths to help our city have a healthier and safer future.

The Cincinnati Fire Museum Safe House is in need of an update to better serve our visitors and and make a stronger impact in our community. Our goal is to renovate the existing Safe House and incorporate audio/visual components for a dynamic, modern exhibit that will resonate strongly with visitors, especially children.

We have begun the initial process, and through careful research, selected a design firm that has provided a cost proposal and project implementation plan. We anticipate a complete structural renovation, with the addition of technology, will cost \$500,000. As the Museum approaches our 40th year anniversary, there is no better time to focus our fundraising initiatives toward this renovation. In 2020, we will implement a fundraising campaign to update the Safe House so we can put this proposal into action.

SPECIAL EVENTS

FIRE SAFETY OPEN HOUSE

On Saturday, October 12, the Cincinnati Fire Museum hosted a Fire Safety Open House in partnership the Cincinnati Fire Department. The event coincided with BLINK 2019 and drew a nice audience to the Museum in the name of fire safety. On top of fire safety and history tours, we offered visitors fire truck rides, drink and snacks, face painting, and half-off admission. The Fire Department provided fire safety literature and fire helmets to children who attended.





SANTA RESCUE

Our first annual Santa Rescue was held on Saturday, November 30th at noon sharp! The event took place at the Fire Museum, where the brave Cincinnati firefighters of Ladder 3 rescued Santa from his perilous perch on the Museum's rooftop. Members of the press were invited and encouraged to attend the event and we received a couple of spots on the morning and evening news. Additionally, photographer Glenn Hartong created a 30 second clip of the event that received over 7k social media views. Afterwards, guest were invited in

to learn firsthand about the important history and fire safety education the Fire Museum presents and line up to sit on Santa's lap and enjoy hot chocolate and treats.

9/11 MEMORIAL RIDE






Year in Review

INCOME



The Cincinnati Fire Museum relies heavily on donations for operating support. These donations come in the form of gifts from individual donors, foundations and grant awards, memorial gifts, and corporate support. We also receive support from Cincinnati firefighters who opt into the payroll deduction plan and have automatic contributions deducted from their check at an amount that is comfortable to each member.



As demonstrated above, the largest expense the Museum incurred is staffing and administration, followed by insurance and professional fees.


